We'll soak in Morocco's vibrant blend of Roman, Arab, Byzantine and Berber heritage as we explore the characteristic art and architecture of Islamic Morocco, with its intricate stucco and wood carving and colourful zellij mosaic tilework.

We'll see charming medieval towns with their warrens of market streets and exquisitely decorated medersas as well as cities that boast labyrinthine souks, palaces and gardens. And we'll take in Morocco's spectacular natural scenery, from the High Atlas Mountains to the cedar forests of Middle Atlas and the edge of the Sahara Desert.

A perfect blend of culture, incredible landscapes and local delicacies, this tour will take you in a leisurely manner to the best of what this region has to offer.

DETAILED ITINERARY

Start & Finish

The tour starts at 10.00am on Wednesday 13 September, at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, Casablanca. The tour ends after breakfast on Sunday 1 October, at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, Casablanca.

Included meals are indicated with B, L, D.

Wednesday 13 September

Arrive Casablanca

The tour commences at the hotel in Casablanca at 10.00am. Meet your tour leader and fellow travellers in the lobby of the hotel for an orientation tour of Casablanca before travelling to Rabat, where we'll spend our first two nights. On arrival in Rabat, we'll take after an orientation walk, before enjoying welcome drinks and dinner together. Overnight Rabat (D)

Thursday 14 September

Rabat

We begin the day with a visit to the archaeological site of Chellah, a Roman trading post later used as a royal burial ground by 13th and 14th-century dynastic rulers. We continue to the Archaeological Museum and its magnificent collection of Roman bronzes. After lunch we'll see the imposing tower of the ruined 12th-century Hassan mosque alongside the grand modern mausoleum of Mohammad V. We stop at the Kasbah des Oudaïas with its 12th-century fortifications, Andalusian garden, charming whitewashed houses and view across the Bou Regreg estuary to the old walled town of Salé on the other side. Overnight Rabat (B, L)

Friday 15 September

Lixus & Tangier

This morning we leave Rabat to drive along the coast to Tangier. We stop to visit the picturesque though overgrown ruins of ancient Lixus, in Roman times a wealthy port famous for its salt and garum, a pungent fish sauce featured in many Roman recipes. On the way to the acropolis we'll see the public baths and the amphitheatre that once staged wild beast shows and gladiatorial contests. After lunch at a restaurant by the sea we continue to Tangier. Overnight Tangier (B, L)

Saturday 16 September

Tangier

A gateway between Africa and Europe, Tangier once had a reputation for seediness, but has now polished up its allure as an international tourist spot. We'll begin with the American Legation Museum, an historic building with an interesting art collection and a section dedicated to American composer and writer Paul Bowles, who spent most his life in the city. A walk through the medina's streets will take us past the once-glamorous Hotel Continental and the house that belonged to Woolworth heiress Barbara Hutton. The kasbah, at the top of the hill, houses a splendid museum in the former residence of the sultan. In the



TOUR HIGHLIGHTS

Marrakesh

Marvel at the elegant Koutoubia minaret, which towers over this vibrant city's powder-pink medina and bustling central square. Wander through luxuriant palace gardens and fine examples of Islamic architecture.

Tangier

Explore this buzzy Moroccan port on the Strait of Gibraltar. A strategic gateway between Africa and Europe since ancient times, it still has the energy that comes from this confluence of cultures.

Fes el Bali

Stroll the narrow alleys and colourful souks of Morocco's oldest imperial capital, where traders ply their wares and donkeys deliver loads to shops as they've done for centuries.

Volubilis

See the impressive ruins of this 3rd c B.C.E. Mauritanian capital. The wealth garnered from its production of olive oil is still evident in its monumental buildings.

Amazing Landscapes

Enjoy a variety of landscapes from the Atlantic to the Sahara: from fertile plains behind Atlantic coast sand dunes to forested mountain ranges to impressive desert wastelands and dramatic valleys.

Ville Nouvelle we see the churchyard of St. Andrews Anglican Church, where several well-known expatriate Tangerinos are buried and the Café de Paris, famous rendezvous during the International Zone era. There is time to relax before enjoying dinner. Overnight Tangier (B, D)

Sunday 17 September **Chefchaouen**

Today we travel through the Rif to Chefchaouen, a picturesque walled town known for its blue-washed buildings with red-tiled roofs adorned with pots of flowers. We'll tour the compact medina and kasbah before we have lunch and check into our centrally located riad. The afternoon is free for relaxation and further exploration. Overnight Chefchaouen (B, L)

Monday 18 September **Fes**

A morning drive through lovely countryside takes us to the ancient imperial capital of Fes el Bali. After lunch we visit the Musée Batha, a converted 19th-century palace with pleasant gardens and an excellent collection of wood carving, metalwork, costumes and pottery. Before driving to our hotel, we walk through the Jewish Mellah, where the old houses are distinguished by their wooden shutters and wood and wrought iron balconies. Overnight Fes (B, L, D)

Tuesday 19 September **Medina of Fes**

Entering through the Bab Boujeloud gate in the old city walls, we begin our exploration of the Fes el Bali medina with a visit to the Medersa Bou Inania, an intricate masterpiece of Merenid architecture. We walk through the souk, with its shops and stalls selling foodstuffs, perfumes, hardware, clothing, shoes and slippers, silks, embroidery and spices, stopping to visit old fondouks, some of which are still used as warehouses and workshops by local artisans. We look around the area of the great Kairouine mosque and the fascinating tanneries that use age-old methods of treating and dyeing hides. Overnight Fes (B)

Wednesday 20 September **Volubilis**

This morning we drive from Fes to the archaeological site of Volubilis. Once capital of the Roman Province of Mauretania, its ruins are picturesquely located on a high ridge above a fertile valley. We'll walk past an industrial area, where several olive oil presses have been found, to the city centre with its forum, capitol and basilica and imposing triumphal arch. The streets beyond are lined with grand private houses, many of which still have their beautiful mosaic floors. Near the entrance is a museum with numerous finds from the site and excellent explanations. After our visit we return to Fes. Overnight Fes (B, L)

Thursday 21 September **Musée du Batha**

This morning we visit the Musée du Batha, a converted 19th century palace with pleasant gardens and an excellent collection of wood carving, metalwork, costumes and pottery. Stroll through the Jewish Mellah, where the old houses are distinguished by their wooden shutters and wood and wrought iron balconies. This afternoon there will be some free time before dinner. Overnight Fes (B, D)

Friday 22 September **To Marrakesh**

We depart for the long drive to Marrakesh, stopping en route to have lunch and see examples of local carpet weaving. Overnight Marrakesh (B, L, D)

Saturday 23 September **Marrakesh Palaces and Souks**

Our Marrakesh exploration begins at the 16th-century Sultan Ahmed el Mansour's marble and gilt Saadian tombs, and the Badi Palace with its sunken gardens and pavilion housing the original wooden minbar from the Koutoubia Mosque, a masterpiece of 12th-century Moorish art. Past the Jewish Mellah, we come to the Bahia palace, built in the 19th-century by a black slave who became grand vizier. A stroll through narrow streets and alleys brings us to the lively main square, overlooked by the Koutoubia minaret, one of the symbols of the city. After an independent lunch we explore the colourful souks north of the square and visit the Ben Youssef Medersa, an exquisite 14th-century Koranic school. We end our day at Le Jardin Secret, a restored 19th-century palace and garden. Overnight Marrakesh (B)

Sunday 24 September **Marrakesh Gardens and Art**

This morning we travel a short distance outside Marrakesh to visit the modern sculpture exhibits of the Anima Garden, established by Viennese multi-media artist André Heller. Upon return we see the lovely Jardin Majorelle, designed by artists in the 1940s and bought by Yves Saint Laurent and Pierre Bergé in 1980. We'll visit a small museum of Yves Saint Laurent's artwork and a Berber museum in Jacques Majorelle's former cubist painting studio. The afternoon is free for relaxation or further exploration. Overnight Marrakesh (B, D)

Monday 25 September **Ouarzazate**

Today we enjoy spectacular scenery as we cross the High Atlas Mountains over the winding Tiz n'Tichka pass. We stop for lunch at Ait Benhaddou, where Lawrence of Arabia was filmed. The ksar or fortified old town, now largely abandoned but protected as a heritage site, is a striking example of southern

WEATHER

Morocco's climate is very diverse. The coastal regions have a Mediterranean climate; the interior features the Atlas Mountains and plateaus while the Southern regions see the Sahara Desert.

Moroccan mudbrick architecture. We continue to Ouarzazate and the splendid Taourirt Kasbah, former residence of the pasha of Marrakesh, Thami el Glaoui, before checking into our hotel. Overnight Ouarzazate (B, L, D)

Tuesday 26 September

Drâa Valley

We spend a full day driving south along the Drâa valley, part of the ancient trade route across the Sahara. A long fertile strip dotted with date palm oases and fortified towns and villages, it runs beneath a high ridge of the Anti-Atlas Mountains. We have lunch and walk through the palmerie at Nkob before returning to Ouarzazate. Overnight Ouarzazate (B, L)

Wednesday 27 September

Taroudant

Today we make the beautiful drive to Taroudant, stopping for a late lunch at the Riad Hida in Ouled Berhil. On arrival in Taroudant, we'll stroll around the elegant little town with its circuit of warm reddish-brown walls, stopping at the Arab Souk for some shopping. Overnight Taroudant (B, L)

Thursday 28 September

Essaouira

Today we drive to the Atlantic coast and the harbour town of Essaouira with lunch en route. After checking into our hotel there is time to relax before we gather in the beachfront bar to watch the sun set into the Atlantic. Overnight Essaouira (B, L, D)

Friday 29 September

Essaouira

Our visit to Essaouira, an 18th-century town surrounded by impressive ramparts, begins at the harbour, where every morning the fishing boats bring in the catch to be sold at the nearby market. We walk along the ramparts by the Skala bastion for views across the ocean and stroll through the medina with its whitewashed houses, woodworkers' and jewellers' souks and former Jewish Mellah. The afternoon is at leisure. Overnight Essaouira (B)

Saturday 30 September

El Jadida and Casablanca

We depart Essaouira this morning via the scenic coastal road, stopping for lunch at El Jadida and its old Portuguese medina, a UNESCO World Heritage site. After lunch we walk along the ramparts and through the streets to see the Church of the Assumption and the minaret of the Grand Mosque, which once acted as a lighthouse. We continue to Casablanca where we gather in the evening for a farewell dinner. Overnight Casablanca (B, L, D)

Sunday 1 October

Depart Casablanca

The tour ends this morning after breakfast. Please consult your individual travel documents for your outbound journey. (B)
